

Velvet was a popular trend seen in the Berlin shows this season, and the Holy Ghost Fall/Winter 2013 runway was no exception. Utilizing the fabric through their collection, it was also brought through in the accessories. The show opened strong with a leather jacket draped over the shoulders of a tuxedo-top and bow tie clad model. # **FACE**


A great product to achieve the matte-finish look is NARS Sheer Matte Foundation.



Hair Trends that save you TIME but

If you're sick of spending endless hours poring over magazine photos and trying to copy

complex hair designs, you should know that you don't need a bunch of fancy equipment or a consultation with a hairdresser to look great. And if you're the sort who spends months debating whether it's time to make the big chop or go bold with a new color, fear not. You don't have to break out the scissors to keep up with the latest trends. Runway caught up with Lisa Fox, a hairdresser at Atlanta-based Stephen Harvey Salon, and she let us in on the big secret: fabulous hair doesn't need to cost a lot of money, and with a few quick tricks, you can be out the door with fabulous hair in no time at all.



Voluminous tresses never go out of style, and celebrities' roots are getting bigger and bigger. "Velcro rollers are the tried-and-true method for adding volume," says Fox. The key is to place the rollers so that they lift up your roots. If you put them too low, you'll end up with waves, but less volume. For an even more voluminous effect, try curling the ends of your hair to create springy waves and curls.

Try putting the rollers in your hair before you go to bed and sleeping on them for a ready-to-wear knockout look. If you need to wash your hair in the morning, though, you can still create lustworthy waves. Pop the rollers in when your hair is damp, then blow-dry or allow your hair to air-dry. For an extra boost, try a volumizing root lifter. Fox loves KMS's Add Volume and Matrix's Amplify Root Lifter.

stick-straight locks

In the middle of the twentieth century, women used clothing irons to straighten unruly hair. Thankfully, stick-straight hair no longer requires that you own an ironing board. Try a straightening iron – preferably an ionic one – and make sure it heats up evenly. Hot and cold spots can wreck your hair.

Fox cautions would-be fashionistas that regular straightening is not a recipe for hair health. "Everybody needs a thermal protectant to protect their hair from the ravages of a straightening iron," she says. And as for going over sections of hair multiple times? Just don't do it. "People with fine hair should straighten inch-wide sections at a time to eliminate the need to keep raking the iron across the hair," Fox states emphatically, "And if you have thick hair, stick to half-inch wide sections." You can boost the staying power of your straightening job by using an anti-frizz serum and washing only every other day.

So no more worrying about what you're going to do with your hair, and no more endless combing through fashion magazines

seeking out your next look. With a few tools you can buy at your local drug store, you can try out three new looks this week!












Side bangs have become a contemporary classic, with virtually every A-list celebrity sporting the look at one time or another. "Side bangs work so well because people with a variety of face shapes can pull them off," Fox explains. Never had bangs before? Scared to break out the scissors! No problem. You can fake the look without ever having to worry about re-growing your bangs.

Fox says the key is retraining your part. Your hair tends to fall according to your everyday part, and if you part your hair down the center like most people, it's time to move that part to the side. While your hair is still wet, create a side part, then pull a section of your hair across your forehead, creating faux side bangs. "The key is to gel your hair into obedience," Fox chuckles. Try applying a spray gel to your bangs and around your part to keep every last hair in place.

If you're not ready to move your part, though, there's an even faster way to create this look. Simply pull a piece of hair across your forehead, then tuck it behind your ear. Pin it in place with a bobby pin, and be sure to hide the bobby pin underneath the rest of your hair. Grabbing bigger sections of hair will create a more dramatic look that can be ideal for camouflaging a large forehead. No one will ever know your bangs



In light of everything going on with actors like Amanda Bynes and Lindsay Lohan, how have you made this transition so smoothly and successfully into acting throughout adulthood?

I am very thankful for my family giving me such a solid foundation. I grew up in a Christian household and keeping that foundation is so important for me and my life now. It keeps me centered and grounded. I wouldn't be who I am without my faith.

A bright, orange, tiger print sweater, and an ensemble that incorporated a tiger printed backpack on a pleated-skirt clad model gave the familiar notion of back to school, injecting a youthful vibrancy in the collection. Oriental print jumpsuits and tight trousers paired with open toe Cavalli boots were a strong addition to the collection, in their powerful fiery red palette. The Cavalli girl seemed to grow up by the finale, as the house presented a sensual red and black, crystal, drop-waist, flapper style dress.





What did you want to be growing up; did you always want to be an actress?

Veterinarian. 100%. That was until my Girl Scout troop took a field trip to the local pet hospital. It's not all cute puppies and fluffy kittens back there. So it was back to the drawing board. After that my dream was to work behind a cash register. I had a fascination with buttons and scanners. Kristen Wiig's character as "The Target Lady" on SNL hits very close to home. That girl is living the dream.

What was your favorite role in a film, and what made it so intriguing?

In a film called "California Scheming" I played a dark, twisted, manipulative teenager named Chloe. She lived life on the edge, took risks, broke the law, and caused trouble everywhere she went. She was a wild child who used the people in her life like pawns in a game of chess. There was also a quality in her that was innocent and lost. Being able to play characters like Chloe is always a treat. It's different and adventurous and complex. You get to forget who you are completely and dive into another identity entirely. I love roles that make you squirm.

What method of acting do you use to get into character and why did you chose that route?

To be honest, I haven't had much formal training. Being in theatre as a kid gave me a taste of technique and the Dos and Dont's of line reading, script analysis, etc. When it comes to my work now I let my heart and imagination do the work. Life experiences have shaped me into the actress I am now and who I aspire to be. And my mistakes too, those definitely helped too.

What has been the biggest challenge so far in your career?

In the thriller, "The Frozen Ground", my character's plot was comprised of grue-some real-life events experienced by the several victims of the serial killer, played by John Cusack. Rather than focusing on character choices, my focus was to bring justice to those victims. That was challenging knowing these women were real and had these horrible things actually happen to them. It was important for me to capture the emotion and make it as real as possible. On a lighter note, avoiding the Kraft service table has always been a challenge.

Is there a role/type of character you want to portray, in the future, that you haven't had the opportunity to yet?

I would love to play a musician. I'm a closet singer and musician and would love to explore that side of myself that I keep so private.

How does being an actress affect your personal life?

It's my job. It's what I do. It's my passion. It has only affected me positively in knowing that I get to do what I love, and am working hard towards my dream.

What has been the most helpful advise you've gotten in your career?


"Say all your lines and don't bump into the furniture".

As an actress who was one of your favorite directors to work with and what made them stand out?

Honestly every director has their own incredible qualities so it is impossible to pick one. But I will say though that the director's that at one point gave a stab at acting and hated it are usually the one's who are the most pleasant to work with. They understand the process.

Do you have any advice for actors trying to break into the business?





I love the phrase, "Shoot for the stars. If you miss, you'll land on the moon." Actor **Dave Anders** must have perfect aim because he sure landed among the stars. Most famous for his role on TV's **Alias**, Dave has been a part of one hit series to the next. I had an opportunity to pick his brain about past projects, future goals, and his sexy trademark English accent.

Do you have a current goal in your career you have yet to achieve?

My goal in this profession is to have choices in film. While TV has been kind to me, I haven't had the best of luck in movies. I've done a smattering of low budget films, straight to DVD films and TV movies, but never a movie that's been in theaters. I also eventually would love to direct.

Why did you decide to turn down the American Academy of Dramatic Arts and continue on to Los Angeles?

At 18, I was accepted there and a few other conservatories across the country...circle in the square in NY among them and It was my intention to attend...but a working actor in LA saw me work and was impressed by my chops. He said "you can always go to school, you can only be 18 once & you're ready". Luckily, my mother was in the room and I looked at her and she smiled and said "ok". So I moved to LA, straight out of high school, got an agent and began the journey.

What method of acting do you do to get into character and why did you chose that route?

I honestly don't use one single technique, but take what vibes with me from a few. Meisner, Stanislavsky etc. Acting is all listening and responding with truth and selling people back to themselves. Hopefully, I succeed in doing that.

Was there ever a point in your career where you thought you may have to give up your dream?

Just before I got my "break" on Alias I was pretty down on myself and thought maybe I wasn't supposed to be doing this. But then JJ Abrams came calling and it's all been aces since. Luck/Timing/Talent has a lot to do with getting work in this business.

What was it like growing up in a family with siblings from different backgrounds?

My family is just like any other family, just with a few different hues. We grew up in a small fairly close minded town so there

were issues for Jason & Maili at times and seeing that was tough.

My parent's goal for all of us is to be happy in whatever we choose to do and they also let us find God for ourselves allowing us to find ourselves for ourselves. I love my family very much.

> Being a household name yourself, have you ever been star struck meeting another actor?

> Sure, many, times. I remember one time, Bradley Cooper and I were at our friend's birthday party and we were aware that Warren Beatty was going to be in attendance, at some point. We watched the door for hours, in anticipation and then it finally happened! 'The Beatts' walked through and we were giddy, like school girls meeting and chatting with him. He was the epitome of cool.

If you could star along side one actor in an upcoming film, whom would you want to work with?

Daniel Day-Lewis, Gary Oldman, Philip Seymour Hoffman, Meryl Streep or Will Ferrell. That's one actor, right?

How do you recognize a good role in a film?

A good role for me is one with conflict, both internal and external, who has a compelling arc - and it is completely different from the last guy I played. Movie stardom appeals to me because of the choices it provides, but being a successful character actor & playing a multitude of diverse types of people appeals more.

I notice you like to use a British accent in a lot of your roles, would you say that it is a trademark trait?

I suppose I do like to use the accent, but it's not like its my choice to do so. It's the choice of whoever is in charge and its part specific. A lot of folks think I am English, which is validating and frustrating all at once. And yes to this point I'd say it's my "trademark"!

I have so much fun with Lilly Lashes, because unlike my swimwear line, the lashes are something I get to use and enjoy every-single-day. It's no secret I'm a ghalichi glamazon, so I love to play around with my lashes and create different looks each day.

I decided to create Lilly Lashes while filming my first season of Bravo's The Shahs of Sunset. **DSQUARED2**, created by Canadian twins Dean and Dan Caten, is a line known for being chic, provocative, and glamorous. The highly sophisticated fashion combined with heavy sex appeal and confidence makes for a perfect brand that appeals to classic fashionistas and stylish rockers alike.

The collections range from ultra-sexy to super androgynous, but all maintain pristine tailoring and quality, using nothing but the best fabrics. Whatever the theme, the shows are always full of attitude, personality, and showmanship.

#### THE HISTORY

Dean and Dan Caten grew up the youngest of nine children in a suburb of Toronto. Even as boys, they had the fashion bug and designed outfits for their older sisters. They pursued design school together in New York in 1983 but only stayed for one semester. In the years that followed, they started their first line DEanDAN and went on to work as creative directors at Ports International

Their big break came when they moved to Milan in 1991 and worked as designers for Gianni Versace and Diesel. It was there in 1994 when they produced their first men's collection. It was that show that launched the label that now hosts world-famous shows for both men's and women's collections.

#### THE STYLE

DSquared2 is known for their attitude and blend of styles. They take influences from their Canadian upbringing, their Italian heritage and experience, and American ideals. The shows are heavy in theatrics but keep enough focus on the luxurious fabrics and Italian tailoring. With all the precise tailoring, it's easy to see that shape and form are key. The designs have a constant battle to keep the balance between sophistication and youth.

The models are full of life and fun—no static runway walks here. The twins once described the DSquared2 girl as self-assured, vibrant and sexy, and that she is. She walks to music that proclaims her life "Ain't Nobody's Business" (Rihanna). She puts great care into what she looks like, but her goal is to be happy and self-confident; popularity is low on her list of priorities. She has a constant stream of attention, but she doesn't depend on it. It's all about attitude.

#### **CELEBRITY APPEAL**

Being that DSquared2 collections have a large glam-rock element, it may not be a surprise that musicians fawn all over the clothes. Music stars from Rihanna to Justin Timberlake have donned DSquared2 outfits. Knee length dresses were featured in a darker palette including a black mesh and redfeather body-con dress with a deep V-neck in the mesh, evoking feminine sensuality. The word of the year for you is NEW! You had a new show launch in January, appropriately for this conversation called omg! Insider. What is it like stepping into a hosting position of such a great show?

It's been a blast. First of all, I've always wanted to work on an entertainment show that was conversational and had a unique editorial voice. And of course, I was coming back to CBS to work with many of the same people, I worked with over at Entertainment Tonight – the two shows are produced in the same offices – so it was like coming home to family.

So break it down for all of us moms out there who are looking at you like you're Wonder Woman right now, what does a typical day in the life of Thea look like?

Well, I'm definitely no Wonder Woman! I'm usually up around 4:45am-ish, which is tough because after years of going to bed late - I can never quite get used to turning in early, no matter how tired I am! Our day starts with a 5:15am news call and then we go pretty much flat out until the early afternoon. The good news is, I usually get to leave the office earlier than most working moms. It's nice to have the ability to do school pick-ups and afternoon activities, since I don't get to see my sons in the mornings from Monday to Friday. We have a family dinner every night – that's really important to me.

Do you think it is important for moms to take off time to spend with their family before returning to work?

I think a lot of moms don't have the option of taking much time off, before they return to work, for many reasons. It could be they're contract workers or freelancers, who are not being paid while they're gone, or that they're worried about losing their jobs. I'm originally from Canada, where maternity leave is usually a year. In the States, I think the standard is three months - but I've known alot of moms in both places that get pulled back even earlier because they feel pressure to be on the job. I'm not sure what the answer is, but I know that every mom needs to do what's right for them and their family. It would be wonderful if every working mom had a choice and sadly, many don't.

With such a packed agenda, how do you manage your style to transition from hip and fashionable TV personality to supermom ready to hit up a soccer game?

Ha! I'm laughing that you think I'm hip and fashionable! We have great stylists who find clothes for us to wear on the show, so that helps...especially since I hate shopping! To be honest the "look" of our show is really an extension of how I dress for everyday life — lots of jeans, flowy tops, and a few pieces of cool jewelry thrown in here and there. In the beginning our stylists were experimenting with a lot of structured dresses, which I actually love, but don't really dress like that on a day to day basis. My kids are still young, so for the most part I wear clothes that are wash and go, because I'm always getting little faces and hands full of dirt, food, paint, or whatever else wiped on me. I go basic with clothes and then try to indulge my fashion whims in things that don't need dry cleaning — accessories!

You have had an interesting career starting out as a producer for Fashion Television, then you sort of dived into the world of sports with shows like ESPN's Cold Pizza and now you are doing entertainment. How were you able to establish such a versatile career?

Honestly – luck. And also because I'm interested in a lot of different things and open to trying new things. But mostly luck.

To folks that are just starting out in their career and view you as a role model or inspiration, how do you not get discouraged and move forward when a show you are on gets cancelled?

Look, it can be really tough, but television shows get cancelled ALL the time. If you want to work in this business you can't let that faze you. Of course, it's discouraging, but it's also just part of how the business works and if you're the type of person who is overly sensitive to that kind of disappointment, this may not be the career for you. Television evolves rapidly, network priorities change constantly and shows can go away very quickly. I've been there a few times.

What are your top 5 daily must-haves you keep in your purse right now that you suggest no woman go without?

iPhone. A sample size jar of La Mer. Random candies to bribe my kids with in case of emergency. A Perfect Foods bar. Probably 50 old hair elastics. George Clooney's phone number. Okay, that's not really in there, but it should be. For my girlfriends of course – I'm married!!!

A big part of your job now is interacting on social media. Can you talk a little bit about how social media sites like Twitter have changed the way hosts and journalists interact with the public or even with other celebrities?

It means we're a lot more accessible to the people who watch us. If those people like what we're doing — or they don't - they'll let us know directly. So there's more opportunity for conversation and exchange of ideas, and there's also a lot of feedback, whether you like it or not! Also it's a chance for the audience to get to know you better, to understand a little more about who you really are and what your values and interests are apart from what they see on screen. Social media may be the platform that helps them decide whether they really relate to you or not. I think there's a great opportunity to share yourself in much more authentic way than traditional media offers, because it's so immediate — there are no filters.

Now right on your Twitter for all the world to see, you claim to be the "BEST cupcake maker EVER\*" according to the little ones in your house. Do you have a killer recipe you can share?

My new obsession: margarita cupcakes. The recipe is pretty simple – Google it. And if you want to make my personal favorite version, add ten times the amount of tequila they tell you to. To the icing too – don't be shy. Oh, and don't give them to your kids.

You've been married since 2007, what are some ways you and your hubby keep the romance alive between your crazy work schedule and the kids and just the chaos of life?

That's a funny question, because my husband and I met when we were 17 years old. We know everything about one another and we still really dig each other – how's that for true romance? He makes me laugh, more than anyone on the planet. I never feel disconnected from him, no matter how much of that "chaos" is going on. We just plow through it and when we get to the finish line, we crack open a nice bottle of wine, and chill and forget the rest of the world. It's kind of a Friday night ritual for us. Maybe that's one of the benefits of being best friends with someone for a really long time.

Now I've noticed that you have quite a few acting credits under your belt! Any plans on having a breakout film or television role in the future?

Doubtful – I'm a terrible actor! But if you need someone to play a reporter or a TV host – now that I can do. Award winning performances!

Ok now be honest, is it weird going from being the interviewer or host to being the interviewee? What questions would you ask yourself if you were conducting the interview?

Hmmmmmm.....I would ask for George Clooney's phone number, but you already know I don't have it!

You already have a growing, beautiful, healthy family and wildly successful career so what is next for you on this adventure of life?

Who knows? I'm not much of a planner – in my industry you really can't predict what's coming next. But one thing I've never done is buy a house. I'm finally doing it, so renovating that will be an adventure – a great big, messy, scary, dusty, expensive adventure! I'm slightly terrified, but in a good way.

What advice would you give to other marvelous, working moms like yourself to maintain balance in their lives?

Don't beat yourself up too much about trying to find balance. None of the working moms I know have got that whole balance thing down perfectly yet. If it were easy...well that would just be boring now, wouldn't it?





# SIN QUIRIN

I recently got the pleasure of speaking with Sin Quirin of Ministry. I have to say, he is not only one of the most talented and hard working artists I have had the pleasure to speak with, but by far the most engaging. Take a peek as we discuss the perils of being on the road, transitioning from one band to another, and of course, over zealous fans and stalkers.

Is there a style of music you want to create a song in but have yet to execute?

To be honest, and this might surprise some people, I wish I could've created an amazing disco song from the '70s. I'm all about the '70s. I was a kid growing up then, and that's actually a style of music that not a lot of people know that I listen to. I have a ton of respect for some of those '70s disco funk bands. I also wish I could grow an afro.

What was it like to receive your first Grammy nomination?

I almost crashed my car when I heard that we were nominated. That's a true story. I was in El Paso driving to get something to eat, when my engineer called me on the phone and said, "You're never gonna guess...We just got nominated for a Grammy." I literally almost ran the car off the side of the road. It felt good to be recognized and to be up there with our peers and bands like Slayer, Lamb of God, etc. It was an amazing experience that I'll never ever forget. One of the highlights of being at the Grammy's was me peeing in a stall next to Tony Bennet, and him patting me on the back after he washed his hands, congratulating me on our nomination. True story.

Who is someone you have had the opportunity to play with who has really stood out to you?

I would have to say one of my all time favorite bands, Cheap Trick. I had the amazing opportunity to join Cheap Trick on stage for two sold out nights at the Hollywood Bowl in Los Angeles, and that was definitely a childhood dream.

What is the craziest thing you've seen on tour?

The craziest thing would have to be seeing women backstage getting lunchmeat thrown at their rear ends.

Have you ever had a fan stalk you?

Yes, I have. Many years ago, I had a girl follow us from the states up into Canada and back down into the states. She would follow behind the bus and literally stay at every hotel that we stayed at. Every night she would somehow find out what room I was in and pound on my door. After the last show in New York, she showed up with homemade chocolate chip cookies. I didn't know what the hell was in them, so I gave them to our roadies. After I saw that they didn't drop dead, I ate a few and they were pretty

good. That night, she completely freaked out when she wasn't allowed backstage again, and was crying hysterically saying that she loved me. That was the last time I saw her until several months later. I was flipping the channels on my TV, and she was on a 'Jerry Springer' episode.

What is your favorite part about being a part of Ministry?

My favorite part is literally just being a part of one of my all time favorite bands. I love every aspect of being in Ministry. Writing and creating songs with Al Jourgensen and playing some of my all

time favorite songs along side Al on tour is a huge rush.

Did being on the road a lot affect your personal life?

Yes. It affects every aspect of your personal life. Relationships, whether they are friends or more, always suffer, but it's all part of what we sign up to do. It's very tough to find someone that completely understands this lifestyle.

What, to date, has been your favorite song that you've released, and why?

I would have to say "Let's Go." The reason is that was the lead track of the very first Ministry record that I co-wrote songs with Al on. I was completely flattered that he put my song as the album opener. That song was also the opening song on our 2008 tour.

When you transition from one band into another is it hard, like leaving a family, or is it more of a way to evolve and change?

I wouldn't say that it's necessarily hard. You just have to get into a different frame of mind depending on the project. When I'm

writing Ministry songs, I definitely have to get into that head-space. When I'm writing, say, a Revolting Cocks song, I have to completely shift gears and make those songs sound like a Rev-Co song. Luckily, my taste in music is so diverse that the transition isn't incredibly difficult, and I actually like the songs more so than some family members.

Although there is band effort, do you consider AmeriCON your personal project?

In a way, I did consider AmeriCON a personal project, although I did want to incorporate everyone's input and ideas. However, with my current project, Supermanic, it is definitely a band effort. I didn't want Supermanic to be a Sin solo project. I was more about making it a brand new band with everyone contributing equally.

So Tenille this may be the weirdest way to kick off an interview ever, but I love that your Twitter says "Crazy animal mama obsessed with stamping my passport &rescuing pups in need" Will you pretty please talk to us about your passion for animals and the efforts you are making to save them?

Of course! I have always loved animals, and brought home every stray I came across in life, surely not making my parents too thrilled. Now, I work with Bill Foundation, an organization that rescues pups on the kill list and/or on the streets, working to rehabilitate them and find forever homes. There are adoption events held every other Sunday in Santa Monica at The Healthy Spot. The most recent addition to my clan was a pup I was fostering and then completely fell in love and had to keep him, I am now what we call a "failed foster." So my one bedroom apartment now houses two cats and two dogs:)

You recently starred in the film "The Canyons" alongside Lindsay Lohan and James Deen. Can you give us the lowdown on the film and tell us a little bit about what that filming experience was like?

It was quite an experience right from the start. The script is intensely dark and follows five 20 something LA'ers through the twist and turns in their crazy lives and





torrid affairs. James's character, Christian, is a trust fund kid financing a slasher flick that his assistant Gina is producing and hiring her boyfriend (played by Nolan) to play the lead who crazy enough used to date Christian's girlfriend, played by Lindsay. My character, Cynthia Grey, has a past with Nolan and is currently the side piece to Christian. Nolan and I cook up a story that is sure to push Lindsay to leave James in hopes that I get James to myself and Nolan gets Lindsay back... A lot of stuff going on in this film for sure! It was such a great experience filming at fantastic locations and really seeing DIY filmmaking at its best.

You also recently filmed "The List." Alright girl, give us the goods; what is it, what's your role and where and when can we see it?

Being a budding starlet, there's not a whole lot about you floating around for public consumption about who you really are. So, Tenille, who are you? Where did you grow up? What inspired you to be an actor? What's your favorite color? (I had to throw that last one in there)

I am a Virgo and I like long walks on the beach... ha just kidding. I am an outdoor junkie who loves continually challenging myself and trying new things. I grew up in Sacramento as the youngest and only girl in a family of 4, so I was a complete tomboy. You are involved in many aspects from the film and entertainment industry and wear many hats with different responsibilities. Which is your favorite and most fun role you have had to date and why?

The two roles I've recently played on HBO's The Newsroom and Getting On are hands down the most fun I've ever had. I've been an Aaron Sorkin fan since I was a kid, and I loved Mark V. Olsen and Will Scheffer's show Big Love for its five season run. So to be able to work with those guys was unbelievable.

I also co-wrote and directed a short film a few years ago, and we are now making our rounds in the film festival circuit. That was by far the most challenging, yet one of the most rewarding things I've done. I got to direct and act alongside one of my favorite actors, Tom Noonan, in the film. He won Sundance with What Happened Was... and really gave me some brilliant guidance as an actor/filmmaker.

Now that you have your dream job on The Newsroom and another program lined up on HBO, what other career goals do you have on the horizon?

My biggest goal is to continue to get acting roles and do them well. I love the "work" of the job. I like rehearsing, continually asking questions, molding and shaping and carving out a scene until it's as good as it can be. The people I admired most growing up were the ones who not only constantly worked as actors but also created their own work on top of it. Some people who come to mind are: Robert Duvall, Billy Bob Thornton, George Clooney, and Clint Eastwood. My goals are to do great work, stay busy, and make great movies like those guys. That and playing center field in Major League Baseball are my life ambitions.

You came from a strong theater background and still continue to pursue this to help develop you further as an actor. What recommendations would you give to those just starting out that don't have any theater experience but want to break into the industry?

I had the fortune of studying at some great theatres growing up, including The Steppenwolf in Chicago. However, I don't think you necessarily have to start out doing theatre to develop yourself as an actor. I have friends that started right away in front of a camera, and they are endlessly talented. The one thing I might offer to someone starting out is to find some place to put in the work. Whether if it is on a stage, in front of a camera, or in a class; that is the most important thing. Like anything in life, I think to develop yourself

in your field you have to put in thousands of hours of work. That is one of the advantages of theatre. When you're in a play, you are acting for two hours at a time, five, six, sometimes eight times a week. You can really put in a lot of reps.

Based on your resume alone, you exhibit characteristics of what might be deemed a triple threat. Where do you see your greatest talents and is there anything you would like to try that you haven't already attempted in the industry?

Acting is and always will be my greatest passion. I loved writing and directing and plan on doing it more, but I believe both those things can make you a stronger actor. There is still so much in my career I want to do. I would love to work on a baseball movie; I have an unhealthy obsession with baseball. I would also like to work on more Shakespeare in the near future; Shakespeare in The Park (Central Park) has always been a goal of mine.

Video games are sprinkled throughout your IMDB regarding some voice-over work you have done. How did you get involved with Aliens: Colonial Marines and Lost Planet2? Do they let you try out the games before you do the voice-over?

I wish. In my experience, most of the games I've worked on have been far from done with animation and graphics before I stepped into the voiceover booth. I've only been able to try the games a long while after, sometimes years.

As a young filmmaker, what are the best tips and advice you have received to help you in your current projects?

When you make something on a small budget like I did, a filmmaker friend told me to expect mini disasters. That was the best advice I was given because, sure enough, they happened. But, because there was this sort of anticipated chaos, it didn't derail the plan like it could have. Our production van was broken into about four hours after we started shooting on day one. They stole my laptop, pre-production notes, and storyboards. In a way, it was a blessing because so much production work had to be improvised, which made it even better in my estimation.

Is there any film character or superhero role you would love to have the chance to perform?

Superhero? I'd have to go with The Flash. I think it would be more fun to be the prince than the king, and that's sort of how I see that guy in the Justice League. Plus, he's a wisecracking jokester, and I always love playing those roles!

Drama or comedy? Which do you like more and share what your favorite genre of film is and why?

I imagine this is what it feels like when a parent is asked to admit their favorite child. I definitely think comedy can be more challenging. There's just more of a science to it; the rhythm of it, the timing of it, and then throwing that all away and playing around. It can be a handful. But my favorite performances are when actors find a piece of comedy in something serious, or a very grounded, vulnerable moment in a comedy. It all comes down to the script, and I rarely like something that is all drama or all

Since you have a great voice, would you ever consider having a radio or talk show?

If I had a great wingman, yes. My favorite talk show is the Ricky Gervais Show where he and Steve Merchant sling a barrage of existential questions at Karl Pilkington. He plays the perfect idiot. It would have to be something like that, but I doubt there's another Karl Pilkington anywhere to be found. He's the best.

In addition to Aaron Sorkin, which other screenwriters or producers do you follow and/or want to work with and aspire to learn from as your career continues to evolve?

My wish list is too long for this page, but I'd certainly start with the guys I mentioned before: Duvall, Billy Bob, Clooney, and Eastwood. The Coen brothers have always made some of my favorite films. I recently watched an interview with Tom Hanks talking about how much he learned as an actor from working with Steven Spielberg. He'd have to be at the top of every actor's list.

With baseball and running being part of your sports focus, what is your workout regime to stay healthy and fit?

I'm competitive by nature. One of my sisters is an ultra-runner and averages more than a dozen marathons a year; even did a hundred miler last year, so I have to put my version of "healthy and fit" in context. I'm trying to get to her level, but for the time being I run several times a week and do a light version of P90X training. Then in the fall, I throw wings and beer every Sunday during the Packers games into my routine. That's when I kick up the running a few notches.

You've worked coast to coast, what's your favorite city and where do you see yourself living long term, city or destination?

That's easy, Rome. There are many places I haven't visited, but of the places I've lived and

been, nothing compares to Italy. I also go through spells of missing New York City after living there for years. It will always have a piece of my heart. I've gone back several times over the last few years for theatre jobs, and I hope to continue that. My mom lives in Brooklyn, and my father lives in Milwaukee. Living on the West Coast, I try and visit my father in Milwaukee and mother in Brooklyn as much as possible. I like that balance.

How does it feel to be on the red carpet and actually winning an Emmy?

I don't get to do red carpet events often, so they're very exciting. It was so surreal being on the red carpet, being interviewed by major entertainment news crews. Winning an Emmy was just next level. I was freaking out!

From "One Life to Live" to "General Hospital", what highlights have you experienced in your newer role as Kiki Jerome?

Being a new character was a challenge! I was scared, thinking of whether or not people would accept her. Believe it or not, that was the highlight. Being the same character for so many years, I felt a lack of change or growth as an actress and this experience was just the wakeup call, I needed.

One of your talents is singing; what is your favorite song to sing currently and do you see yourself in the future ever recording an album?

I would LOVE to! The music industry is very tough to get into though. For now, I'd really love to sing the National Anthem at a Philadelphia, Eagles game. That's one of my dreams.

As a kid, you were inspired by Godzilla vs. The Thing to create a Godzilla costume which led to employment with Six Flags and more costume creations. Can you tell us about that original costume that started it all? What did you use? How did you make it?

Well, the first full size monster costume I made was Godzilla, and this was done when I was a junior in high school in Jacksonville, FL in 1976. Before that, I was very focused on making stop motion animation films in the style of the late Ray Harryhausen. Every day after school my friend and I would go into his garage where we had our little studio set up, and we'd shoot Super 8 monsters one frame at a time. However, it started to seem like we were spending more time making the puppets than animating them and our creatures were becoming more sophisticated. Finally, we decided to use the same techniques we used to make the puppets, foam fabrication, and make a full-size suit. The choice of what to make was obvious. We both loved Godzilla! With a group of artist friends helping, we made our first suit and took it to a Sci-Fi convention in Houston where it won first place in the costume context. Someone from 6 Flags over Texas saw it and hired us to make one for them; been making mon-

After starting your own effects company, Imagination Productions, you had the opportunity to work on everything from Pee Wee's Big Adventure to Yo Gabba Gabba to creating props for bands like KISS, ICP, and more. What have been the three highlights of your career so far?

Imagination Productions started in Jacksonville and consisted of the five artists who worked on that first Godzilla suit, almost all of whom moved to L.A. in the early 80's and have all had very successful careers in FX. I have always remained a freelance artist and worked for several companies. The downside is that sometimes credit for the work goes to the company and not to the artist. That is why my name is lesser known than it might be had I been credited. For those periods, you find holes in my imdb.com credits. I've recently changed that by starting my own FX company with my daughter, Constance Hall. We are now DaiKaiju Co; DaiKaiju is the Japanese term for GIANT MONSTERI



As far as the Highlights go, everything you just mentioned to start with! I was nominated for an Emmy for Costume Design on Yo Gabba Gabba; NEVER dreamed that would happen. Also, playing Godzilla in Pee Wee's Big Adventure was like a dream come true, as was doing Gene Simmons' armor for KISS.

You have a more extensive acting career than most people realize, but you are most famous for Troll. Tell us what that was like!

Well, my part in Troll ended up on the cutting room floor, at least my live action roll. I was puppeteer on many of the creatures, including the cute mushroom. I also set up all the staging for the shots where numerous puppets worked together. That was some trick because we were shooting in Italy, and I had to find 12 puppeteers who understood enough English to work with.

As for my acting rolls, I've played a lot of psycho killers over the last 25 years, and I've always done them in a rather over the top, humorous style. Recently, I did an independent horror film called The Black Dahlia Haunting. It was written and directed by Brandon Slagle.

In this film, I play George Hodel Jr., the man most likely to be Elizabeth Short's killer. We shot my scenes around my insane appearance schedule. so there was no time for me to prepare, rehearse, or read the script. The result is a scene that my ex-wife, Sonia, can't handle watching. For one thing, unlike other killers I have played, there is NO humor in my eyes. At one point during the killing, you see a tear roll down my cheek. For this role, I received the Best Killer award at Shockfest



2013; that was a meat cleaver with my name engraved on it. The film is scheduled for an October release.

How did you make that decision to say, "OK, I really enjoy making this stuff for fun, so I think I'll make a career out of this," and what advice do you have for people whose minds are beautifully twisted like yours and wish to make a job out of what comes from their imagination?

Being in the right place at the right time has always been the way my career has gone. I gave up trying to plan things long ago. As far as new people wanting to get into the monster biz, I have to say, since the advent of CGI, it's not like it used to be. There is nowhere near as much work out there. But I don't want to discourage anyone! I just tell them, "Follow you Dreams, but have a back-up plan!"

Tell us a little bit about Monster Man on the SyFy Channel, and how that whole idea came about? A lot of fans thought the show was actually cancelled, but at SDCC it was confirmed that there will be a

season two after all. Yay! I hear we can now catch it on the new home on beTV as well?

To be honest, the show Monster Man was not anything I had ever imagined happening. I was out at a Goth club around midnight when I got a call. A company shooting a reality show about people who survive animal attacks, I Lived was the title I think, needed the back of a whale to shoot a re-enactment at the Fantasy II tank at 7:30 a.m.! So I said "Sure!" Anyway, when the club closed, I headed back to the shop and made this 10' whale back. When it was done around 7 a.m., I started to load it for delivery, but it wouldn't fit in my hearse! So, I tied it on top and drove it to set. When I pulled up, my makeup smeared and spattered in latex, in a hearse with a whale on top. I jumped out and said, "Somebody order a whale here?" The producer thought it was so funny he said, "I'm going to do a reality show

about you!" I said, "Yeah. Sure." And they

It was a matter of being in the right place at the right time in the right car! I just found out we are running on beTV and in all Asian countries. We just finished three encore runs in Latin areas.

Has there ever been a monster or a project that was extremely difficult for you to bring to life? I mean when do you reach that point when you say, "There, that's perfect! That's exactly what I envisioned in my head"?

Probably the 26' replica of Toothless from How to Train Your Dragon; I had very lit-

> tle reference images. The film wasn't out yet. I practically had to hack the advertising site to get hi-res images. It was built over a mechanical bull, like in a western bar. It was supposed to have a full framework welded, but then we found out the pad under the thing was an 18" inflatable mat. I had to build the whole thing off the center pylon of the bull and fully fiberglass it for structure before adding detail, which was made up of millions of lentils to replicate the

tiny bump texture of the beast. It was a nightmare. However, when it was done, it looked AWESOME!

So walk us through your process of making a monster. Start with the point of brainstorming and move through the steps.

I look at the design I'm working from, then stare at a sheet of foam for a couple hours and build it in my head. I smoke a lot of cigarettes at this time. When I think I have it, I start hacking and slashing the foam and glue it into a monster.







Do you prefer getting contacted to make monsters for a film or a project or is there more artistic freedom in coming up with original creations? How much liberty do you have to create on your terms when you are brought on board for a project?

I love being brought into a project in which I get to collaborate with other creative minds, and together we combine our ideas into one badass creature. I usually have a great deal of input because when I'm offered a project, it's because the production knows they are bringing my years of experience to the table and can pinpoint potential problems and how to avoid them during filming.

The passion for effects is carried on in the family. What is it like having this be a family business?

It's awesome! I know exactly what to expect from each of my crew members, and know they're not going to let me down. They may drive me insane occasionally, but I also know when faced with impossible deadlines, I can work them to death!

Who are some of the masters you learned from, and now in turn, are there any great prodigies rising under you wing of guidance?

Well, my greatest inspirations would have to be first and foremost Rick Baker. We met in 1977 at a horror convention, and he was always very encouraging, not to mention really funny and great to hang out with. Two other FX Masters who were great influences

were the late Ray Harryhausen and his amazing stop motion creatures, and Eiji Tsuburya, the man responsible for creating the FX for so many of the Godzilla films and other DaiKaiju.

Fans can catch you out at a lot of different cons promoting various projects and collaborations. What are you cooking up right now? Anything special for Halloween?

Well, first let me say, I spent almost every weekend last year traveling to different states each week to attend horror conventions to meet fans of the show and personally thank each of them. I would lose my voice by the third day, but it is very important to me to thank them for their support because without them, there would be no show. When we first premiered, we were scheduled opposite the new season of South Park, the highest rated show on cable! Needless to say, our numbers, according to the archaic Nielson Rating System, were less than spectacular. But people would DVR the show and watch later. Then watch it three or four more times, and then show their friends, their kids, their dog groomers, etc. The show began to build a huge fan base by word-of-mouth. I was completely shocked at my early appearances when I would get mobbed by

fans. To be honest, it all felt very surreal after so many years of working in anonymity. I still do a lot of personal appearances, but I am hoping to cut down on the travelling so I can focus on some new projects in the works. One of the most exciting projects, to me, is developing a new TV series which will be produced by Lou Pizarro, who is known for his hit show Operation Repo. The show will feature many giant monsters in battle in the style of the Ultraman series from Japan. Larry Blamire has come on board as director. He's best known for his hilarious parody of '50s Sci-Fi films, The Lost Skeleton of Cadavra. One of the most exciting aspects of this project is that I will be making monsters in collaboration with Shinichi Wakasa. He is my brother and is the Japanese Monster Man. He makes the Godzilla suits and other creatures for Toho Films. The title of the project is KAIJU FORCE!

As for Halloween, first I plan to take my five-year-old daughter, Zoe Stardust, trick-or-treating! And my daughter, Constance, and I are planning a huge Halloween party! I will also be finishing work on a project in Seattle for Scare Productions, a wonderful charity haunt that had a badly decomposed gargoyle prop that I'm reconstructing for them.

If you had to pick the top five classic horror movies of all time what would they be and why?

Number one would be The Black Cat, a Universal film from 1934. It was the first film in which Boris Karloff and Bela Lugosi co-starred. It is so far ahead of its time, incredibly subversive, and Lugosi's performance is amazing! The 1933 King Kong, while not exactly a horror film, is certainly the greatest special effects film of all time. Processes were created for that film that are still in use 50 years after, and the personality of the monster is unmatched. Even though Kong is a ferocious beast and kills dozens of people, you still feel sad for him when he meets his end at the top of the Empire State Building. I'm a huge fan of the British horror films produced at Hammer Studios in the '50s through the '70s. My favorites are Dracula Has Risen from the Grave, with Christopher Lee as Dracula for the third time, and Frankenstein Must Be





Destroyed, starring Peter Cushing as Baron Frankenstein. The style of these films, which is best described as Gothic horror, has never been equaled. The original Night of the Living Dead and Texas Chainsaw Massacre are both scary as Hell, and The Exorcist still lives up to its reputation.

To be honest, there are so many great horror films and many that would never be considered "classic" in any way. I still love them for various reasons, and it's near impossible for me to narrow it down to my top five.

Goth and alternative fashion get a lot of their cues from horror. What elements would you like to see incorporated into high fashion?

Black! Lots and lots of black with very pointy shoes and with lots of buckles and long coats. And for girls, very short, black skirts with very high heels and corsets.

What do you feel is the cultural and industry impact you have seen that is attributed to vour show?

Starting with the FX industry, it came as a rather overwhelming surprise to me when I began hearing feedback from many in our industry that we, along with Face Off, were considered standard bearers for Practical FX. After many years in which we saw so many jobs being done with CG instead of Practical, we felt ours was a dying art. But since the airing of our shows, I was told the applications for makeup schools had

increased almost 300% with greatest emphasis placed on FX courses. I also learned that companies that supply materials geared for the FX industry had seen an enormous increase in sales. I never imagined myself in this position but will continue to do all I can to promote the use of Practical FX. I have nothing against the use of CG as an enhancement to a Practical Effect; it should just never replace it. CG takes out the "How did they do that" aspect of FX, and it kind of feels like the magic is gone.

As for cultural impact, I now hear people refer to Monster Man as having a "Cult Following." This may be true as it seems our fans seem to grow and grow in numbers as time passes; many hearing of the show through word-of-mouth, and people having DVR'D the show and introducing it to their friends and so on. One huge surprise to me is how hugely popular it is with kids. We have so many pre-teen fans now. I'm practically considered the Goth Mr. Rogers! I meet so many kids ages five and up who, so I'm told, have overcome their fear of monsters after watching my show. Many of them have drawn or sculpted their own monsters and send me their art. I'm seeing an entire new generation of "Monster Kids." It's great to see kids put down the video games and create this art with their own two hands, and I do all that I can to encourage their interests.

Also, one of the most popular aspects of my show to the general, non-horror fan audience is that it shows my family working together, and by family I don't necessarily mean heredity. By family I am referring to environmental. I've learned that just because you share the same blood doesn't always qualify you as family. But loyalty and support, to me, does. When I was first approached by RUN-WAY to do this photo shoot, the concept was to have me pose with several fashion models surrounding me in Goth attire; sort of like a Death Rock James Bond I imagine. But I countered with the proposal with that I already had several beautiful girls already, starting with my daughters, Constance and Elora, my co-stars on the show. Also from the show is their mom, my ex-wife Sonia Hall, who still works with me. To see THAT magic in action, you better just watch Monster Man. I also wanted to include another cast member, Johnnie Saiko, who has been like a true brother to me since we first met on a project in 1987. Rounding out the shoot is a young lady who is pretty new in my life, but will continue to be a very close part of it for many years to come. Her name is Marie Frances, and she is an extremely talented author who I met while making an appearance at a Seattle horror convention. Her first novel, Nighthawk, completely captivated me, and she is now finishing the sequel, Wishpool.

# ALEXANDER McQUEEN

Alexander McQueen went royal for his Fall/Winter 2013 collection this season during Paris fashion week. It was as if you fused together the contents of Queen Elizabeth's closet with the stained-glass panes and painted architecture of a Catholic cathedral. Each detail was intricate and ornate, and the pearl-encrusted head cages were awe-inspiring. Bedecked in white lace, pleated crinoline skirts and confining corsets that cinched the waists of the already petite-models, each piece of the collection was more fascinating than the last. The palette was a regal mix of black, white and gold, and each piece embedded with pearls. The individual dresses each took an exhaustive two weeks to create. The McQueen house has always had a love for the gothic, and this fall they have presented something truly breathtaking, though hauntingly so.























## BALENCIAGA

Structured, architectural lines and marble were the star creations from the Balenciaga house this season. Your body is like a car: the better you maintain it, the longer it runs. You don't just want to put anything in it. For lunch, I like a nice piece of grilled chicken, fish or some turkey with brown rice or quinoa. I have my snack about 3 hours later, carrots and celery with hummus, then close out with a light dinner, usually a light salad with chicken or some fat free greek yogurt with cinnamon sprinkled on top.

I'm a big proponent of organic, wholesome foods. I know you're going to tell me: "But Agostina, I can't afford to buy organic!". Luckily for you, I have a few tips that will help you save. Organic markets, Whole Foods and Sprouts have a wide variety of these fall favorites, but some can be as expensive as \$3.99/lbs. While your health is worth it, think about heading to your local farmer's market. They have a great selection of organically and locally grown produce without all the added chemicals big companies use on their crops. Not only you get great tasting fruits and vegetables, you also support

local farmers. There's nothing like the aroma you get strolling down the rows of tables. It's a guaranteed sensory overload. And as an added bonus, you just got a little exercise in.

Eat fruits and vegetables that are in season. They typically cost less, because they are readily available. Some fall favorites are: apples. broccoli, beets, brussel sprouts, grapes (just watch the sugar), winter squash (don't let the name fool you), spinach (great source of iron), figs (again, watch that sugar), the star of fall season: pumpkin, and my personal favorite, sweet potato. While they're certainly an acquired taste because of their sweetness, they are packed with essential vitamins and minerals, including Vitamin B6, VItamin C and Vitamin D, which comes in handy if you live somewhere when you don't get a lot of sun during the fall season.

Believe it or not, I also eat it to destress. As a trainer I have to make sure to take care of my muscles and many people underestimate the importance of magnesium in the body. Sweet potatoes are a great source and help your muscles relax and destress.

As mother I know full well what a sweet tooth kids can have. My son is no different. If he could, he'd be eating pancakes for breakfast every day. Luckily I found a happy medium. Let me share one of my favorite recipes. It is easy to make and makes the perfect breakfast or a quick snack, and my son loves it too.

#### **Sweet Potato Pancakes**

#### **Ingredients:**

½ cup oatmeal

2 tablespoons almond or coconut milk

1 medium sweet potato

2 large egg whites

2 tablespoons pecans/nuts, crushed

1 tsp Cinnamon

2 tsp nutmeg

1 tbsp of olive oil

#### **Optional toppings:**

½ apple, sliced

1 tbsp of non-fat greek yogurt (I prefer Fage's 0% greek yogurt)

#### **Directions:**

Boil the sweet potato and mash it. You may leave the skin on for extra fiber if you wish, just make sure you rinse it properly.

Heat up a non stick pan and spray it lightly with some extra virgin olive oil cooking spray.

Mix all ingredients. I sometimes use the blender to make it really smooth.

Pour them ixture onto the skillet using a ladle and form a pancake shape.

On Medium Low, cook slowly and then flip (use a plate if necessary) when golden brown.

Cook other side slowly.

Plate, top with fruit and yogurt and enjoy!

# JEAN PAUL GAULTIER

The Jean Paul Gaultier Fall/Winter show at the Salle Wagram in Paris this season was in a word, iconic. Based on the past signature looks of Gautier's' favorite pop stars, "a homage to all the pop stars of the eighties who have influenced fashion and my fashion with their look," he says, the line still possessed a futuristic air. 






## VALENTINO

An Art Deco cinema palace, Tuschinski cinema is located between the Munt Tower and the Rembrandtplein and was built by Abraham Icek Tuschinski in 1921. Today, the cinema boasts 740 seats including love seats and private boxes, allowing couples to order

wine and small meals.

You have your choice of dining. Stop by the farmers' market on the Nine Streets for a picnic at Vondel Park or dinner at Spanjer En Van Twist, nestled on the Canal of Lilies. Choose between unique dishes like artichoke mousseline or for the more traditional, spaghetti vongole. Top it off with "Van Chocolade" Bon Bons for dessert.

To fully immerse yourself in rich artistic history, visit the Museumplein. Developed in 1872, Museumplein served as the locale for the World Exhibition in 1883. Today, with its Van Gogh Museum–Van Gogh's Japanese prints as well as works by Toulouse-Lautrec are on view in the Rietveld building that serves the viewer with a deeper perspective of Van Gogh's work. Contemporary Artists are on view

at the Stedelijk Museum of Modern Art–view the comic book stylings of Roy Lichtenstein or Warhol's pop cultural iconography. Before departing, visit the Albert Cuypmarkt, a 19th century marketplace populated by Moroccan, Dutch, Turkish, Vietnamese, and Surinamese shopkeepers. Here you'll find everything from textiles resembling Andy Warhol prints, hand painted vases, antique style military camping chairs, or the traditional wooden clogs. For a more upscale shopping experience, visit the new Karl Lagerfeld storefront located at Hartenstraat 16, 1016 Amsterdam. Vaarwel.



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
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
