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





Most people don't change their hair color or style very often because of cost and maintenance. Also, there is the constant element of change that leaves many of us feeling "why bother." The key to staying on trend is to realize that a trend doesn't have to be copied; instead it should be used as an inspiration. If we follow some basic rules and stay true to what works best for us, we will make good choices and stay looking good and feeling current.

Here is what's trending in hair currently: monochromatic color, shorter lengths, texture, and strong statement-making lines. Don't run to the salon and ask for all of them at once! Instead, let's touch on a few of them and see if incorporating elements from one or more will work for you.

First, fashionable monochromatic color or one single color is increasingly popular and eye catching. When choosing a new color, keep in mind that going more than two shades lighter or darker than your natural color creates greater challenges, stress on your hair, and increased cost. Next, make sure you choose the right tone for your skin and eye color. To keep things simple, we are either warm or cool when it comes to tones. Our hair color falls into three basic categories: brown, red, and blonde. Here are some things to remember when choosing the right hair color for you.











Color Me Over

Warm skin undertones include ivory, creamy beige, and

golden brown. Warm eye colors are blue (with yellow flecks), green, blue-green, golden brown, and hazel. A warm brown should appear golden, honey, or mahogany in color. When choosing a warm red, you can't go wrong with auburn or copper. If you have warm undertones and want to be a blonde, select a tawny blonde, like that of the coat of a lion, or a gold beige.

On the cool side, your skin undertones are porcelain, pink, olive, and ebony. Your eyes are light to deep blue, gray, cool green, dark cool brown, and black brown. A cool brown should be an ash or neutral in tone and your red on the violet side, like a burgundy. Cool blondes should be platinum, silver, or taupe.

Color graduation and base shading are techniques that can add interest and dimension to your monochromatic hair color. Your salon professional will select a shade or two darker of the color you've chosen. The lighter shade is applied first, and then the base is added and blended into the lighter. Depending on how dramatic you want the effect, experiment with extending the technique further from the base. Once complete, you will have a soft transition of color with a dramatic effect. The result is quite stunning and creates a deep base from which your lighter color can shine vibrantly. You're sure to turn heads with this multi-dimensional take on monochromatic pallet.

When making changes to your haircut, strong statement making lines add interest and can help you enhance your best features or neutralize ones you are less comfortable with. To make the right choices for your face shape, remember these basic rules: lighter colors serve to expand whereas darker colors tend to contract. If you have a round face, it's best to neutralize those curves with straight lines. Choose a strong horizontal or diagonal fringe to strengthen the brow and eyes, detracting from the cheeks and chin. To elongate the face, choose strong vertical face framing and avoid highlighting around the face.


Texture is also popular this season and is a great way to create shape and volume just where you need it. Regardless if you're enhancing your natural texture or altering it with a professional service, it's fun and easy to play with shape, balance, and proportion with styling tools.

If using irons, be sure to pay attention to the temperature setting. There is seldom a need to apply more than 350 degree heat to your hair at home. Start with the iron at 250 degrees, test the effect, and work up to the desired temperature. You will protect the integrity of your hair and extend the life of your color. Also, make sure your hair is COM-PETELY dry before adding heat from a texture altering tool. If you are spending hours curling or flat ironing your hair, perhaps it's time to talk to your salon professional about a texture altering service. These services have come a long way in recent years offering new technologies that provide, beautiful,



long-lasting solutions to a variety of hair challenges ranging from flat to frizzy. Regardless if you create it with an iron or a professional service, texture is on trend and a fun way to change your look.

Trends will constantly change, and you are sure to find many of them appealing. Take these basic rules to heart and apply them when selecting a new color or cut. Ask your salon professional about your skin tone, face shape, and available texture services. The more you know, the better equipped you are to draw inspiration for trends and always look your best. Your hair is the first thing you look at in the morning, and it is the last thing you check before you walk out the door. But I'm also looking to develop my own acting opportunities during down time. Creation and recreation sometimes go together.

What designers are you into this season?

It's hard for me to drive past the Paul Smith store, and that's more true than ever in 2018. But I'm also finding some fun things coming from Orlebar Brown and Bonobos. For casual, everyday wear, Wil Stiles has short sleeve shirts that don't make me look like a tourist. If I were in my twenties though, I'd probably go broke at Gucci right now. I wandered into one of their stores the other day, and it put a big smile on my face. What is your favorite pair of shoes?

I'm tempted to say the orange pair of Swims I probably wear way too much, because those are the ones people notice and, as an actor, I sometimes like a little attention. But, my absolute favorite footwear are these boots from Taft - black wool and leather - that give me style without being in any way uncomfortable. And who doesn't need a great pair of black shoes?

What about hobbies?

In addition to all the sports, I'm an avid collector of Pan Am memorabilia: posters, badges, china from first class, menus, blankets, dozens and dozens of uniforms, matchbooks, travel bags, decks of cards, historical records, designs of the jets, you name it! As someone who used to fly for Pan Am, I have an attachment to the company that is both professional and deeply personal. It's the job during which you might say I came of age. Collecting bits and pieces of Pan Am is a bit like sorting through my youth. It also helps me remember that I was lucky enough to be a small part of a great story.

Tell us about your time at UCLA?

I went to college in my thirties. It was interesting being surrounded by younger people all the time, but odds are I was a lot more focused on learning than I would have been in my

twenties (when I couldn't resist invitations to parties and night-clubs). I found writing papers extraordinarily difficult. I would almost rather swim with sharks than compose another essay. I ended up getting two degrees, one in history and one in art history. I have a recurring nightmare where a UCLA administrator pulls me out of class and says, "We're very sorry, but we made a mistake and you shouldn't be here." I think that pretty well covers how I felt about myself during that time. I grew up in financially challenging conditions and neither of my parents had ever gone to college. Getting those degrees helped me realize I could do more than I thought I could. It gave me the courage to try acting, which was something I had wanted to do all my life.

What is it like doing so many episodes? What are the challenges?

Filming over two hundred hours of television and playing the same character means you have to keep finding ways to make it fresh without stepping outside the lines you established in the beginning. Also, actors mostly learn the job in public. The hardest thing on earth is leaving the set knowing - absolutely certain - that you didn't do as well as you would have liked. You have to accept it very fast, and come back in the next day, let go of all your internal criticism, and give it your best shot again. If you're lucky, and you try hard, you get better as you go along. I put my whole heart into the role of Buzz Watson, and I hope I made the most of the opportunity. The last thing I'll say is that I am nothing at all like Buzz, but I will always be grateful to him. That sounds odd, but it's the truth.

What is your favorite suit?

You would have to knock me unconscious to take one of my Paul Smith's from my closet, but my favorite suit is a bespoke number I helped design using elements available at Klein Epstein Parker. They custom make every part of the garment according to your own measurements and specifications. And I love the way people react to it.

Do you like watches?

I'm not a jewelry person, although I've given in a bit to the bracelet trend. I admit to liking a Deco inspired Bulova and a Rip Curl I wear surfing. Is that too low end? I have a Mont Blanc for dressier moments but, honestly, I don't like to wear watches at formal events because I hate to be seen checking the time. And I will!







Tell us about your home front.

I'm married and we divide our time between L.A. and the desert. We also love traveling to Europe - when practical - and New York during the fall or spring - if we can get a good rate on a nice room. For those of you whom do not know Jesse she is a key mind helping shape our future with the world of investing by funding women in consumer businesses from fashion and beauty to healthcare. Jesse has made it her life's work to change the gender ratio at the CEO level first through her Emmy nominated talk show 'The Valley Girl Show' where she was the first talk show to ever make it an initiative to interview 50% women in business and now through her venture capital fund Halogen Ventures. Some of her portfolio companies include: WERK, Flex. Carbon 38, BlockCypher, Beautycon & Sugarfina.

Hello Jesse,

You look great today, what are you wearing? Thanks so much. I depend on Carbon38 for most of my comfortable wardrobe attire, especially while I'm pregnant and larger than usual. Today I am wearing a red Carbon38 dress from their Passport collection. I also like to spice up my work attire with one of my rental items from Armoire, a great rental service for boss ladies like me. Ambika, the founder is trying to take the pain out of getting dressed and keeping you looking fabulous while saving you time.

Tell us about your daily schedule?

My son wakes me up every morning somewhere between 6AM and 6:30AM and demands a smoothie. He is obsessed with the blender so I usually sleepily make him some kind of smoothie while he yells 'I want to use the blender smasher' at me in my sleepy haze (for those of you unfamiliar, that is our technical term for the thing in the vitamix that mashes the fruit to help make a smoothie smooth). I then get dressed for the day and try to do at least an hour of uninterrupted email before the chaos begins. My beauty regimen is so fast because I never know if it will be interrupted by my son, husband or someone else. Then COFFEE. At that point I head to our Halogen office or to my first meeting. Depending on the day I usually have a meeting or call with one of our companies, am running around town to meet with an investor or speaking at some kind of entrepreneur oriented event. I think I am a pretty typical working Mom. Today, I had a few back to back networking with other VC funds to share deals.

What is your favorite thing in your closet and why? I love leather jackets. I definitely collect them. I think my all time favorite item is my All Saints leather jacket, that and the Wonder Woman boots I keep in there. You can really get away with wearing a great leather jacket anywhere and with almost anything. I love it when they are broken in to the point that they fit you like a glove. First and foremost, my son. He is 2 and a ball of fun. Professionally, I am really proud to have successfully raised a fund focused purely on investing in women run tech companies. Not many people have been successful doing so in the past. Previously I ran a technology talk show that for 10 years called 'The Valley Girl Show'. We were nominated for an Emmy which I consider a great achievement in another element of my life. I'm also proud of my ability to fly as not many humans can do that.

What is the best product you ever worked with?

There are so many great ones. One of the products I am most excited about right now is Preemadonna, the first NailBot that prints a picture in under 2 seconds directly onto your nail. You could take a picture of the sunset you are looking at and 2 seconds later have it on your nails. The technology is incredible and I can't wait for you all to see it in the market.

What do you think of crypto-currency and how to you think RUNWAY will fair with its new ICO (RUNWAY COIN) www.runwaycoin.org opening to the public in February?

I'm so impressed that RUNWAY is going to have an initial coin offering! That is fantastic. It is the way of the future and I think it will make the financial world a simpler place and overall the world will be better place. We have a great blockchain company called Blockcypher that is like Amazon web services for blockchain and they are doing incredibly well. I am excited to see what happens in the next 5 years.

What schools do you work with?

I try to stay involved in the schools I attended. I went to a small high school called Menlo in Northern California and I went to UCLA for my BA. I now do a lot with UCLA's entrepreneurship programs and women's organizations. My mom also went to an all girls college called Smith that I like being involved with as well. She launched a business plan competition there for universities across the country that has done really well.

Do you work on any non-profits? Tell us about them.

I work with an organization called Bizworld that my Dad started when I was in 3rd grade to teach kids about entrepreneurship. It is now in 80 countries and has taught thousands of elementary students how to look at the world as a business. My grandmother has had Parkinson's disease for 40 years so I am also involved in the Parkinson's Institute.

What do you drive on a daily basis?

Hopskipdrive because it's a safe on demand service for kids and childcare. They are the only 'uber like' service that fingerprints which terrifies you when you realize who you are getting into the car with in an uber or lyft. I'm a terrible driver. I may be one of the only people you will ever meet who has gotten not one but 2 speeding tickets for going over 110MPH (they were both on the 5 freeway for those of you curious how I can go that fast in LA). I have drastically slowed down since having kids but I still have friends and family who won't get in the car with me. I've gotten a letter from the governor suggesting I stay off the road.

If you could only have I pair of shoes what would they be?


